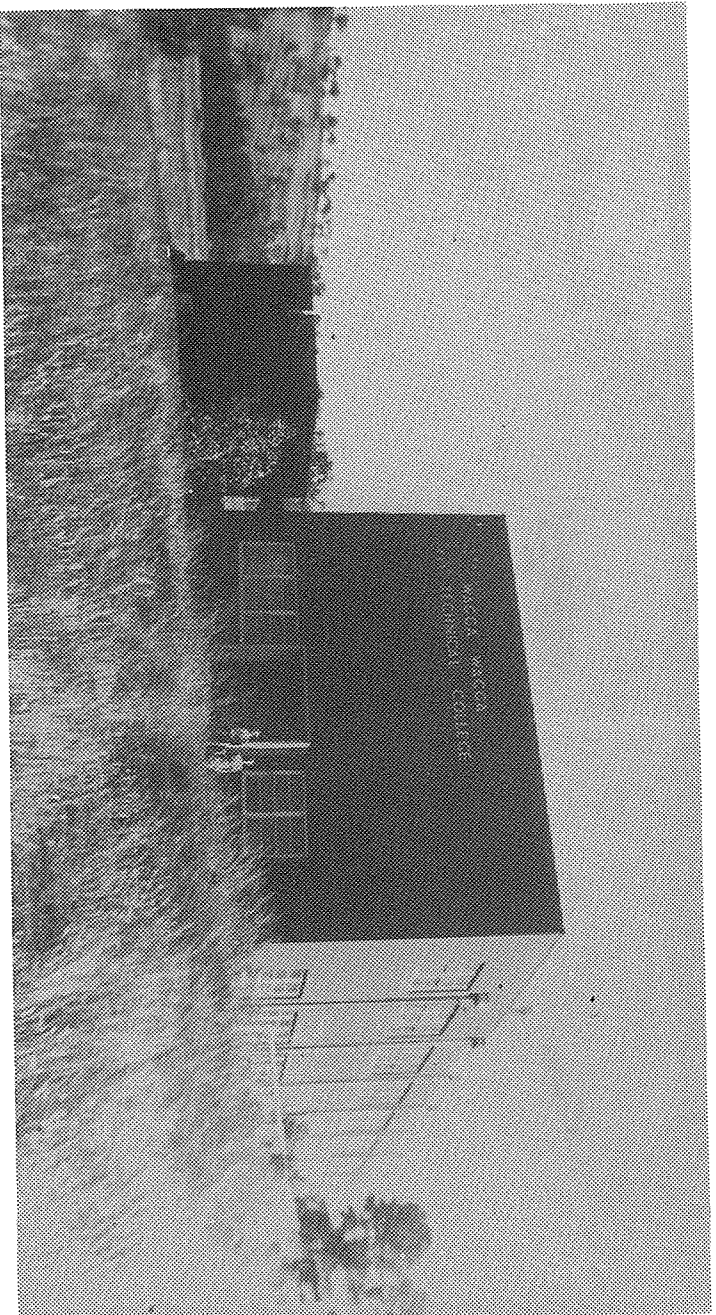

In 1943, the enrolments at the College were 241 and this figure reached 487 by 1944. In 1945, further accommodation was required and the Department took over a portion at Hardy's Building in Baylis Street, where Sheep and Wool, Carpentry and Joinery, and Dressmaking classes were held.
